Aboriginal men are vastly over-represented in Australian prisons. Many offences leading to imprisonment are related to the problematic use of alcohol and other drugs. This research uses a qualitative methodology to investigate the availability of alcohol and other programs in Australian prisons to help Aboriginal men address their alcohol and other drug use issues before being released back into the community.

Michael Doyle is an Aboriginal researcher in the University of New South Wales, Kirby Institute's (formerly the National Centre in HIV Epidemiology & Clinical Research) Justice Health Research program. He has worked in the alcohol and drug research sector for over four years and is completing his Masters of Public Health (UWA) as part of his work on an NHMRC Capacity Building Grant titled 'From Broome to Berrima: Building Capacity Australia Wide in Indigenous Offender Health Research'.
