Professor Kathryn Graham is a Senior Scientist and Head of the Social and Community Interventions and Policy Research Group at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health in Ontario, Canada and Adjunct Professor at the National Drug Research Institute at Curtin University. Her current research focuses on the role of alcohol in aggressive behaviour in licensed premises and between intimate partners; the relation between alcohol use, depression and violence; and international comparisons of negative consequences from alcohol consumption. She led development of the Safer Bars program to reduce aggression in licensed premises and received the Queen’s Golden Jubilee Medal for contributions to applying research knowledge to community interventions. She is first author of two books: Raising the Bar, and Unhappy Hours.

Dr Peter Miller is an NHMRC Howard Florey Fellow at the School of Psychology, Deakin University in Australia. He is also Commissioning Editor of Addiction, the leading international journal on Alcohol and Other Drug use. He was a Senior Clinical Research Worker at the National Addictions Centre, Institute of Psychiatry, King’s College London and Maudsley Hospital. He has also worked at Turning Point Alcohol and Drug Centre in Melbourne and conducted the first research into heroin use in Geelong. He currently heads a major two-year research project into alcohol-related violence in Geelong and Newcastle, and is developing a Quality of Life measure for AOD users in treatment.
