The National Drug Research Institute (NDRI) is one of the largest centres of alcohol and other drug research expertise in Australia.

NDRI is based at Curtin University in Perth, Western Australia. NDRI is an integral part of the national strategy aimed at minimising the harm associated with legal and illegal drug use in Australia.

Our role is to conduct and disseminate high quality research that contributes to effective policy, strategies and practice to prevent and reduce harmful alcohol and other drug use. Our research is complemented by the work of the National Drug and Alcohol Research Centre (NDARC) at the University of New South Wales, the National Centre for Education and Training on Addiction (NCETA) at Flinders University, and the National Centre for Youth Substance Use Research (NCYSUR) at the University of Queensland.

NDRI is supported by core funding from the Australian Government under the Drug and Alcohol Program and also receives significant funding from Curtin University. Additional competitive funds are attracted from a range of state, national and international funding bodies such as the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) and the Australian Research Council (ARC).

Chair's Report

Welcome to the National Drug Research Institute's Annual Report for 2022. This report provides a brief overview of the Institute's achievements during another challenging but productive year.

From my perspective, 2022 could be characterised as a year where emerging from the restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic, NDRI further expanded the impact of its research across a range of areas.

In the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Research Program, for example, Dr Jocelyn Jones and her team submitted a critical report to the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People With Disability.

Also representing many years of work, the decision to make overdose reversal drug naloxone available at no cost to Australian consumers, announced as part of the 2022 Federal Budget, was a watershed for AOD researchers including NDRI Professors Simon Lenton and Paul Dietze, who have long advocated for a national Take Home Naloxone Program.

In response to a request for a tailored training program, NDRI developed and delivered a comprehensive 5-day alcohol and other drug policy and research workshop for Drug & Alcohol Services South Australia.

Including presentations from NDRI Research leaders and expert partners from around the country, the program was extremely well received.

Elsewhere, the impact **NDRI** and expertise of researchers was highlighted via, for example, prestigious sector awards, requests to share research findings presentations around at Australia and around the



world, invitations to provide expertise to government advisory and other policy bodies, and funding successes at local, national and international level.

These outcomes are consistent with and further NDRI's remit, in particular to contribute to the evidence base to prevent and reduce AOD-related harm, enhance national capacity for research, and engage with key groups to translate research findings to policy, strategies and practice.

In closing, I warmly acknowledge and thank the research staff at NDRI for their commitment during 2022, the impressive results of which are outlined in the more detail in the following pages, and my sincere thanks to NDRI Director Professor Simon Lenton, the Institute's support staff and my fellow NDRI Advisory Board members for their continued time, commitment and leadership throughout the year.

Director's Report

NDRI's Statement of Purpose, as included in its Strategic Plan, is to conduct and disseminate high quality research that supports evidence informed policy, strategies and practice approaches to prevent and minimise alcohol and other drug-related health, social and economic harms. It is timely to reflect that research conducted toward this aim can be conducted: within Australian local communities, states and territories; nationally or across Australian jurisdictions; and, internationally where often projects conducted in different countries can have relevance and important implications for Australia. In reviewing the Institute's research activity over 2022, it is apparent that NDRI researchers engage in high quality research at each of these levels of community – local, national and international – all of which have the capacity to inform alcohol and other drug policy and practice in Australia and elsewhere.

The same is also true of the drug and alcohol knowledge and expertise that NDRI academics contribute to working parties, inquiries, advisory bodies and other fora, from local community groups all the way up to international bodies. This activity reflects the esteem NDRI researchers are held in, the relevance of their research and knowledge of the area, their ability to draw on and synthesise bodies of research and make them relevant to real-world problems and effective solutions, and their ability to clearly communicate this to a variety of audiences and partners. Of course, the relevance of the research activity, and it being effectively translated into practice, hinges on the fact that much of the research is conducted by and with community partners. A consistent and continuing hallmark of NDRI's research activity is the considerable effort that has been put into building relationships with community stakeholders, to understand their problems, and to work with them to develop and conduct research that documents the scale of the problems and also involves, or contributes to, developing, trialling and evaluating solutions to address alcohol and other drug-related (AOD) harms.

Enhancing AOD knowledge and research capacity is another aspect of NDRI's work. Noteworthy in this regard in 2022 was NDRI delivering a comprehensive AOD policy and research workshop for Drug & Alcohol Services SA (DASSA). Conducted in Adelaide, the 5-day program featured presentations by NDRI research leaders and expert partners from around the country on many topics including policy change, social determinants of health, alcohol

harm and policy, AOD issues for Aboriginal Australians, methamphetamine consumer perspectives, and harm reduction. NDRI developed the 2022 program to suit DASSA's requirements and an evaluation showed it was extremely well received, with 100 per cent of participants rating the course as worthwhile and 95 per cent prepared to recommend it.



Importantly, this project was a great example of a whole-of-institute approach with the training being ably supported by NDRI Business Services, who worked with researchers (over more than a year thanks to COVID delays) from project conception to post-session evaluation and reporting. The success of the event is a testament to our hard working and high quality people and their ability to work in partnership with the DASSA team and our colleagues from around the country, who also made a great contribution to the event.

During 2022, NDRI Business Manager of over 33 years Fran Davis announced she was retiring. Often described as 'the core' of NDRI, Fran made an enormous contribution to the life of the Institute, managing Business Services, as a key member of the Leadership Team and working closely with several Directors to ensure NDRI's smooth functioning and growth. Fran will be fondly missed but we know she will be enjoying spending more time caravanning and with family and friends.

To conclude, I thank and acknowledge the fantastic contribution and commitment of the whole NDRI team during 2022 and I congratulate those who have received awards and accolades and our students who have successfully completed higher degrees. Through our combined efforts, everyone has made significant contributions to addressing alcohol and other drug related harm in Australia. Thanks again to our primary funders — the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing and Curtin University — and to the NDRI Advisory Board for their support and sage counsel throughout the year.

Highlights and Achievements 2022

- NDRI's research presence in Melbourne grew significantly. In addition to extending our agreement with Burnet Institute, key appointments included Research Fellows Dr Samantha Colledge-Frisby, who brings a wealth of knowledge around injecting drug use, and Dr Nic Taylor, who is working on the declining adolescent drinking Future Fellowship project, as well as Quantitative Analyst Michael Curtis to work on the ARC-funded project investigating social and criminal justice impacts of injecting drug use.
- The overdose reversal drug naloxone was made available at no cost to consumers in all Australian states and territories as part of the 2022 Federal Budget. NDRI Professors Simon Lenton and Paul Dietze were among AOD researchers who recommended and long advocated for a national Take Home Naloxone Program.
- NDRI Professor Steve Allsop was invited to be part of the Australian Government delegation to the UN Commission on Narcotic Drugs in Vienna as well as being reappointed for another three years to ANACAD, the Australian National Advisory Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs, with then-Health Minister Greg Hunt acknowledging his contribution to "...the development and implementation of Australian Government policy and programs...This support has been highly valued by my Department, and contributed to many successful outcomes."
- Dr Jocelyn Jones was awarded a Healthway Health Promotion Intervention Research Grant for 'Working together to reduce the harms from AOD use in an Aboriginal community controlled primary care health context". The NDRI-led study is the first of its kind to apply a continuous quality improvement approach to address AOD issues in an Aboriginal community controlled primary health setting.
- Associate Professor Michael Livingston was awarded the 2022 Australasian Professional Society on Alcohol and Drugs (APSAD) Mid-Career Award, which recognises significant contribution to the AOD field, including through research impact, range and quality of outputs, dissemination of research, and leadership. NDRI Adjunct Associate Professor Kylie Lee was awarded the 2022 APSAD Mentor Award.
- NDRI's Anna Stearne was an Invited Keynote speaker for the APSAD conference, presenting on First Nations Australians' self-determination in alcohol policy. In 2022, Anna also presented an NDRI webinar and to the Mental Health Commission's AOD network on self-determination by First Nations Australians in alcohol policy.



■ National Alcohol Indicators Project Bulletin 17 was published, showing that 4,200 Australian adults died and more than 100,000 were hospitalised from alcohol-attributable causes. During the year, research from NAIP Bulletin 16 was also quoted on leading national morning television show, Sunrise.

Sharing policy, public health knowledge

NDRI delivered a comprehensive AOD policy and research workshop for Drug & Alcohol Services SA (DASSA). DASSA staff had previously attended an NDRI 'winter school' and approached the Institute to deliver a similar training event for its staff.

The 5-day program, with presentations from NDRI Research leaders and expert partners from around the country, covered topics including policy change, social determinants of health, alcohol harm use and policy, AOD issues for Aboriginal Australians, methamphetamine consumer perspectives and harm reduction.

NDRI developed the 2022 program to DASSA's requirements, and an evaluation showed it was extremely well received, with 100 per cent of participants rating the course as worthwhile and 95 per cent prepared to recommend it.

- Professor Steve Allsop was invited to be part of the UK Prevention Working Group to the Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs to develop a Prevention Review, which was provided to the UK Minister of State for Crime, Policing and Justice.
- NDRI's Aboriginal Research Team hosted a NAIDOC Week event at the Eco Education Centre, which included Aboriginal community advisory group members. International FASD expert University of Calgary Professor Dorothy Badry was a special guest during her visit to Perth, which also included Professor Badry delivering an NDRI webinar.
- NDRI staff made a major contribution to the 2022 Lisbon Addictions Conference, which attracted 1800 delegates, with Professor Simon Lenton joining the opening panel on challenges of emerging cannabis markets and NDRI's Professor Paul Dietze, Dr Sam College-Frisby and Michael Curtis all presenting papers.
- Aboriginal Research Program Leader Dr Jocelyn Jones was appointed to the Advisory Board of the WA Office of Crime Statistics and Research, which helps inform criminal justice decision-making and policy development.
- Three PhD scholars submitted their PhD theses: Anna Stearne on Examining and identifying what is needed for change to reduce alcohol related harms in Aboriginal communities in the Northern Territory, William Gilmore on Associations between Government Regulation of Alcohol Availability, Alcohol Use and Health in Australia, and Bernard Fan on Factors in determining development of problem gambling and motivation to change of offenders. Masters student Rose Wally also graduated in February 2022.

- Justice Health Program Leader Dr Mandy Wilson and Aboriginal Research Program Leader Dr Jocelyn Jones were awarded international funding, with colleagues in the U.S., from the Susan and Richard Kiphart Center for Global Health and Social Development to research ways to improve the health and wellbeing of incarcerated women.
- NDRI's application to host Kettil Bruun Society's 2024 symposium in Perth was successful. The Society is an international organisation that promotes social and epidemiology research. Associate Professor Michael Livingston co-convened a Society event in Stockholm, with 25 papers and 30 attendees from 8 countries focused on understanding recent declines in youth drinking.
- Associate Professor Nyanda McBride participated in a special live panel, hosted by Telethon Kids Institute FASD Hub, highlighting that men play a vital role in FASD prevention, awareness and management, particularly as partners supporting an alcohol-free pregnancy.
- Professor Steve Allsop was appointed to the National Suicide Prevention Office Advisory Board and was also appointed Chair of the Western Australian Alcohol and Other Drugs Advisory Board, which assists the Mental Health Commission to develop evidence-based AOD policy and plan support services.
- Dr Jocelyn Jones and her team submitted their final report to the Royal Commission into Violence,
- the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People With Disability; the 'Wangkiny Yirra "Speaking Up" Project: First Nations women and children with disability and their experiences of family and domestic violence' report was in response to a tender request from the Attorney General's Department.



- NDRI hosted a webinar, 'The \$67 billion cost of one of our favourite drugs', after the release of the Examining the Social and *Economic Costs of Alcohol Use in Australia: 2017/18* report. The first national update in a decade of the costs of alcohol use, the report is part of the Social and Economic Costs of Substance Use program, which also outlined costs associated with tobacco, methamphetamine, cannabis and opioid misuse. The webinar outlined alcohol's costs to the community, how updated costs were calculated and the way such areas as FASD and 'protective' effects were treated before an inclusive discussion led by NDRI Alcohol Policy and Strategies Program Leader Professor Tanya Chikritzhs. Dr Robert Tait presented study results.
- Drs Jocelyn Jones and Mandy Wilson are playing a key role in research to better understand and prevent violence as part of a new NHMRC-funded Centre of Research Excellence, leading projects to understand the motives and contexts of Aboriginal women's use of force to inform intervention and prevention among this at-risk cohort and to enhance knowledge of motivations and treatment for use of coercive force.



- Visual media produced by research participants in the Lotterywest-funded Birdiya Miya Homelessness Research Project was showcased to service providers, government representatives and project participants in an exhibition at the Perth Town Hall. Conducted in collaboration with Wungening Aboriginal Corporation, NDRI's Dr Mandy Wilson and her team conducted photovoice workshops and interviews as part of the project.
- Professor Simon Lenton joined Curtin University's "The Future of" podcast to discuss changes in cannabis law in Australia and internationally and options for 'the future of' recreational cannabis regulation.
- NDRI researchers published more than 150 outputs, including refereed journal articles, reports, book chapters and bulletins, and delivered more than 60 presentations at local, national and international events.
- NDRI's 1,070 media mentions reached an audience of more than 4 million, generating the equivalent of \$5.3 million in coverage. In addition, NDRI's social media following passed 3,000 and articles authored by NDRI researchers in The Conversation were read 715,000 times.

Longest serving staff member retires

During 2022, NDRI Business Manager Fran Davis announced she would retire after 33 years and 9 months in the role.

Since our inception in 1986, we have conducted novel, high quality, strategic research that aims to inform Australia's response to alcohol and other drug problems at local, state and national levels. NDRI focuses on research and other outputs that have policy and practice relevance and impact. We work in partnership and collaboration with Australian, state and local governments; with health, social and law enforcement services; and with communities. To ensure broad and enduring impact, capacity building is central to our work. Our researchers come from diverse backgrounds including psychology, epidemiology, biostatistics, sociology, anthropology, medicine and public health. A range of high level skills and a wealth of knowledge contribute to innovative, multi-disciplinary research approaches.

ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG POLICY AND STRATEGIES

Informing, evaluating and investigating policy to ensure the most effective evidence based measures are in place

Policy research takes a broad approach to alcohol and other drugs (AOD) that spans issues that influence social, health, regulatory and enforcement policy in Australia and overseas. It focuses on conducting targeted data collection and trend analysis and monitoring; and evaluating the impact of various models of regulatory and legislative controls and policies on AOD use and its consequences. It aims to inform activities across the sector, in particular government policies and strategies, and has a major focus on assessing the impact of changes in policy at national and international levels, investigating models of control in other countries to build the evidence base, providing strategic advice to government, and informing community debate.

Working with Aboriginal Australians to prevent and reduce alcohol and illicit drug harm

This research contributes to prevention and reduction of the burden of harm caused by alcohol and other drugs (AOD) among Aboriginal Australians. INNOVATION IN PREVENTION AND EARLY INTERVENTION

Innovative and effective ways to delay or prevent alcohol and other drug use and harm

This research aims to prevent early and problematic use of alcohol and other drugs (AOD) and adverse consequences, particularly during childhood and adolescence. It includes a focus on early intervention programs for high risk children, families and communities and incorporates research and evaluations of the social determinants of AOD use and the impact of AOD use during pregnancy. The research builds on international work exploring social and economic benefits of prevention and early intervention, particularly among marginalised populations, on more equitable health outcomes, reduced hazardous and harmful drug use, safer children and more cohesive communities.

SOCIAL CONTEXTS OF ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG USE

Understanding where and when use happens and how we talk about it to prevent use and reduce barriers to treatment

This research concentrates on impacts of various social contexts on AOD use, and associated consequences. NDRI widely disseminates its research findings to increase awareness of drug related harm and effective prevention strategies, and to inform community debate and public health policy and practice. Research is disseminated through various means, including publications, presentations and the media, to policy makers, practitioners, public health professionals, other researchers, interest groups and the community.

Connections

Drug and Alcohol Research Connections - or Connections - is an online newsletter published jointly by NDRI and its sister organisations, the National Drug and Alcohol Research Centre (NDARC) and the National Centre for Education and Training on Addiction (NCETA). Connections covers the latest on research and publications, news and events from the three national centres, with a focus on the translation of research into policy and practice.

In addition to regular news and research updates, in 2022 NDRI's contributions included 'Conversation With...' articles featuring Paul Dietze and Jocelyn Jones and Opinion pieces examining the growing challenge of prescription, alcohol and other drug use among the elderly as well as outlining the support Aboriginal girls need from service providers, as uncovered by the 'YAWG' project. *Connections* is online at connections.edu.au.

Social Media

Recognising changes in communication in recent years, and the growing reliance of many segments of NDRI's target audience on social media to stay informed, NDRI has progressively increased its presence on social media as another means to disseminate research findings.

In 2022, the regular posting of relevant and useful content saw NDRI's following on Twitter and Facebook grow to more than 3,100. In addition, NDRI webinar recordings are posted on the Institute's YouTube channel and LinkedIn is utilised to attract applicants for employment opportunities.

The Conversation

The Conversation is a respected outlet that aims to share academic research and the knowledge of subject experts on topical issues. In 2022, articles published on The Conversation website by NDRI researchers, on topics ranging from the effect of the pandemic on alcohol and other drug use and drug 'scare' campaigns to drink spiking and drug law reform, were read by an audience of more than 715,000 readers in more than 10 countries across the globe.

Website

NDRI views its website, at ndri.curtin.edu.au, as the Institute's 'public face', playing a critical role in sharing research news and disseminating research findings to raise its profile and reputation and assist in putting relevant research findings in front of policy makers and practitioners.

In addition, the NDRI website is the central information source for employment opportunities at the Institute as well as recruitment of participants to take part in NDRI research projects. In 2022, continual updating of topical and useful content saw the NDRI website receive more than 20,000 visitors.

Media

Traditional and online media remain important conduits for NDRI research to reach the community and inform policy. NDRI has built a reputation as a reliable source of scientific information and expertise on a range of issues concerned with the prevention of alcohol- and drug-related harm.

NDRI received 1,070 mentions in the media during 2022, with the provision of expert comment and evidence based research further enhancing NDRI's efforts to disseminate its research findings widely and to inform and participate in alcohol and other drug policy development in Australia.

NDRI research and expert commentary appeared in local, national and international electronic and print media, including news and opinion websites, on a diverse range of subjects relating to alcohol and other drug use, reflecting the variety of expertise at the Institute.

Topics that generated the most media interest included: the economic and social costs of alcohol use to Australia; preventing 'hangovers'; drug policy and law reform; declines in youth drinking and increasing trends towards non-alcoholic beverages; alcohol and drug use and testing in the workplace; and the impact of COVID-19 on alcohol and other drug use, including 'staying safe' as pandemic restrictions were eased.
